

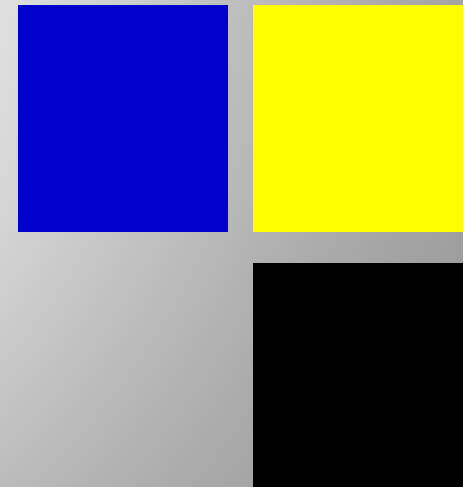

- ◆ Operation of undergraduate and graduate degree programs in English and establishment of support systems
- ◆ Operation of the Support Office offering one-stop services
- ◆ Formation of networks with other Japanese universities, along with diverse partnerships and collaborations
- ◆ Engaging in partnerships and collaborations with industry in the Kansai region

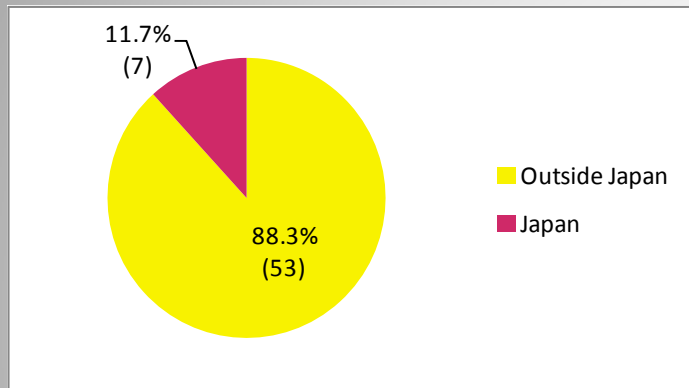

What is interesting about this program is that it offers a wide range of choices, so I can absorb all sorts of knowledge in the fields I'm interested in.

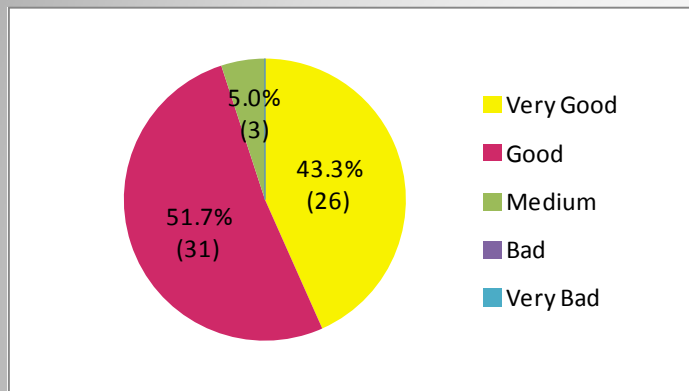
It's also appealing because I can study English and Japanese at the same time. It's great to be able to develop international relationships while living in Japan.



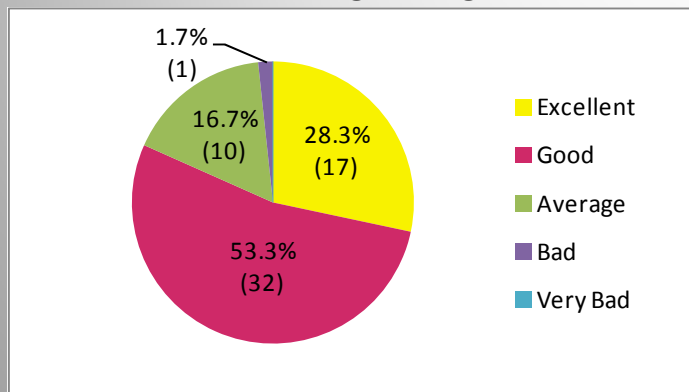

There are people from many different countries enrolled in this program, making it like a microcosm of the world.

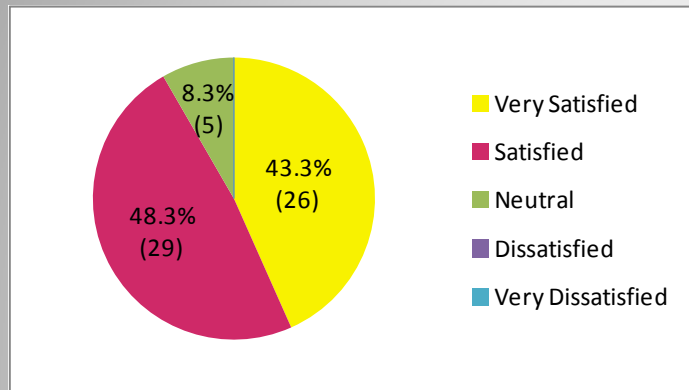
The advantage of this program is that a single class includes people from different countries' cultures, meaning you can learn that real people are different from images based on cultural stereotypes.



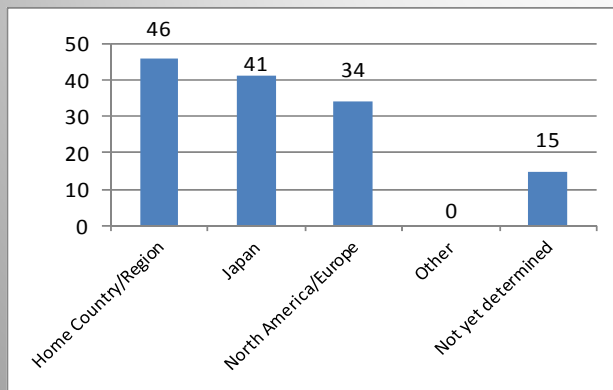

The university offers very generous support to students, meaning that I can concentrate on my studies without worrying about other matters

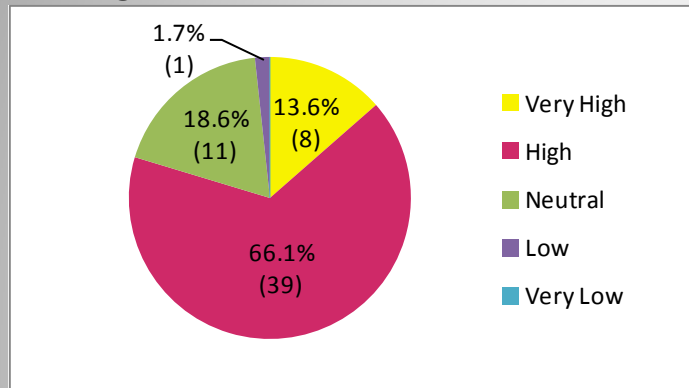
If I were to ask one thing, it would be to offer a more detailed orientation at the time of enrollment, which would enable people to enjoy a more fruitful student life.



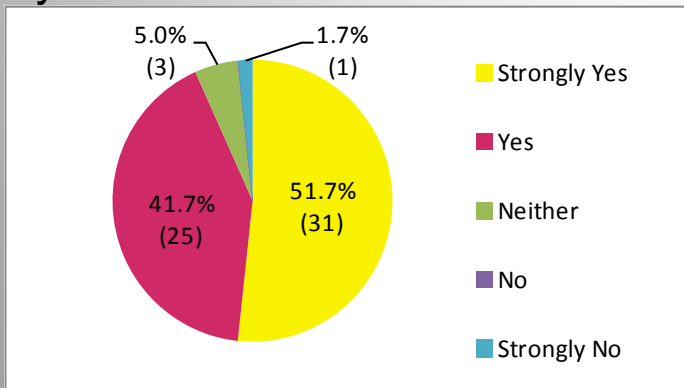

Comments from students (points for future improvement)

- The university should offer better support for finding employment in Japan.
- The number of elective subjects should be increased.
- There should be more opportunities to interact with Japanese students.



2. Status of Initiatives Approach toward Internationalization

- ◆ Osaka University Academic Initiatives for 2012–2015:
“To be a university that shines forth even into the 22nd Century”
 - Becoming a global university with worldwide aspirations to which the world aspires
 - Project for Establishing University Network for Internationalization comprise one priority policy for enhancing the internationalization of Osaka University

- ◆ Internationalization of administrative framework
 - Send employees to overseas every year (cumulatively totaling over 60 staff)
 - Implementation of a staff recruitment examination unique to Osaka University (from FY2011)

- ◆ Evaluation and improvement
 - G30 External Evaluation Committee (to be carried out during FY2012)



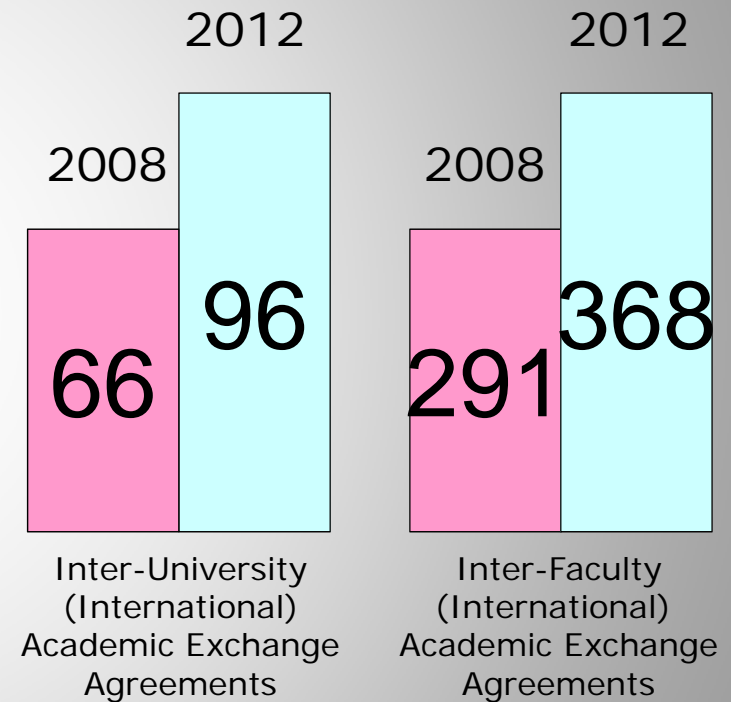


2. Status of Initiatives Partnership with Overseas University and Student Exchange



- ◆ Improved educational partnerships with overseas universities

- ◆ Enhancement of SS (Short Stay) and SV (Short Visit) project
 - * JASSO short stay/short visit projects:
FY 2012 - 27 programs involving 623 students selected (2nd nationally, 1st among national universities)
 - * Osaka University's own system of grants for sending students for training overseas:
FY 2012 - 16 programs involving 206 students
 - * Improvement to systems at university
 - Guidelines on credit conversion, orientations and meetings



2. Status of Initiatives Inter-university and University-industry Collaboration

- ◆ Osaka-Kobe University Network for Internationalization
 - Joint Education Fairs (Thailand, Vietnam)
 - Student Global Competence Workshop (December 2011)

- ◆ Collaboration with industry
 - Global 30 University-Business Joint Forum
 - Global Human Resources Utilization Study Group (led by Kansai Economic Federation)
 - Recruitment experience seminars by alumni/alumnae who have found work, and corporate seminars

2. Status of Initiatives Providing High-quality Teaching

- ◆ Faculty with a record of international teaching and research
- ◆ International College
 - Support the operation (PR, admission, etc.) of undergraduate degree programs taught in English
 - Provide general education subjects
- ◆ Coordinated and systematic curriculum design
 - Curriculum designed following the recommended curriculum of higher education institutes of UK
 - Outstanding students can graduate early after a shortened period of 3.5 years
 - Interdisciplinary class
 - Honor seminars with world-renowned lecturers
- ◆ “Teaching Quality Handbook”
- ◆ Improvement of teaching skills through FD



◆ Network of Overseas Centers

- Directors are either stationed in the countries concerned or seconded from Osaka University

◆ Features

- Promote PR activities
- Support student recruitment activities (education fairs, high school visits)
- Used as interview locations for the G30 programs
- Plan and provide support for short-term overseas study programs
- Continue routine interactions with major local universities



2. Status of Initiatives Initiatives to Accept International Students



- ◆ Preparation for the PR and student recruitment system
 - Assignment of full-time faculty with priority responsibility for the PR and student recruitment
 - Five countries set as priority targets for international students: China, Thailand, Vietnam, USA and the Netherlands
 - Holding seminars including faculty and staff involved in PR and student recruitment activities

- ◆ Specific activities for student recruitment
 - Participation in education fairs run by JASSO and other organizations
 - Visits to leading local high schools and schools in Japan approved to offer the International Baccalaureate
 - Visits to universities with which Osaka University has signed academic exchange agreements and other leading universities

2. Status of Initiatives Support for International Students

- ◆ Provide various support such as daily life, economic, study and career development

- ◆ Specific examples
 - Priority allocation of 30 rooms in Osaka University International House to students enrolled in G30 programs
 - Waiving application fees for applicants to G30 programs
 - Students enrolled in G30 programs with outstanding grades exempted from enrollment and tuition fees
 - Holding seminars for students regarding experience of former international students
 - Holding “Internship Lectures” with invited speakers
 - Collaboration between the Support Office and the Information Room for International Students at the Center for International Education and Exchange

2. Status of Initiatives Response to Interim Assessment

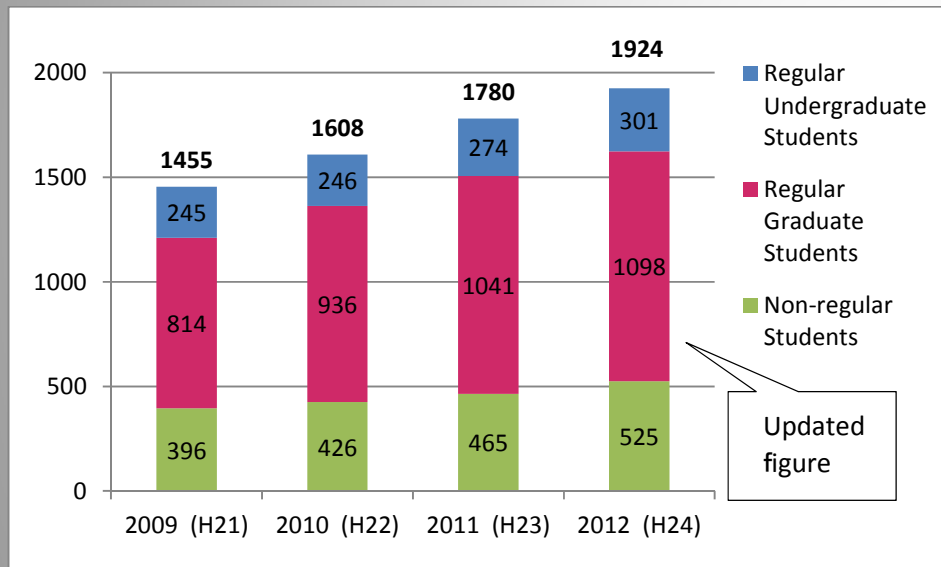


- ◆ Comments pointed out in interim assessment
 - Increase opportunity for interaction between students on the G30 programs and Japanese students
 - Increase the level of awareness of the G30 Project within the university

- ◆ The following initiatives are being or will be implemented
 - G30 subjects will be offered to Japanese students as classes offered by the Center for Education in Liberal Arts and Sciences
 - Some of experimental class and lectures will be taken by both students enrolled in G30 programs and Japanese students
 - Visits to several research laboratories among several schools, with opportunities for interaction with Japanese students
 - G30 subjects will be offered to “Consortium of Universities in Osaka”
 - The International College will provide articles for the internal student magazine
 - Symposia led mainly by faculty of G30 programs will be held

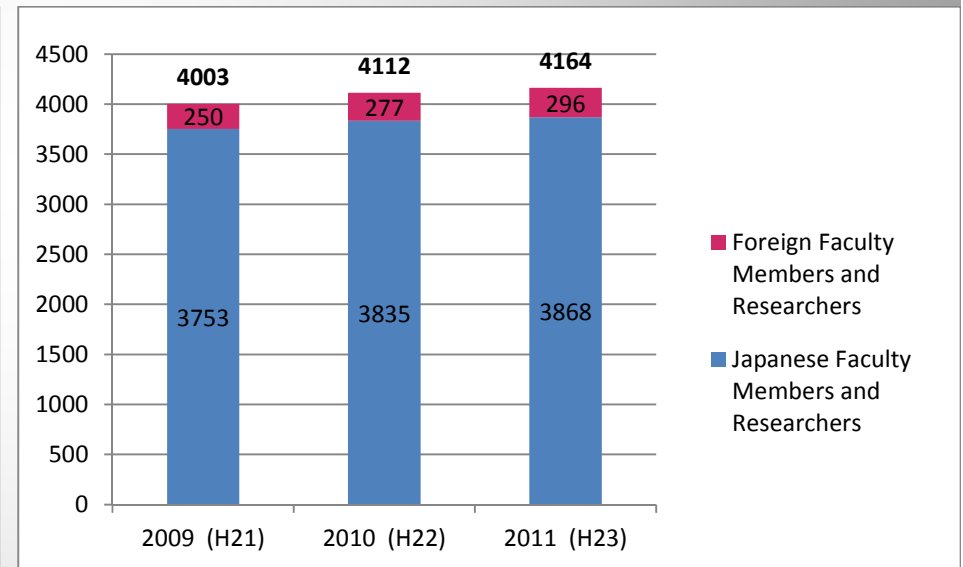
3. Progress toward Achieving Targets

(As of May 1 each year)

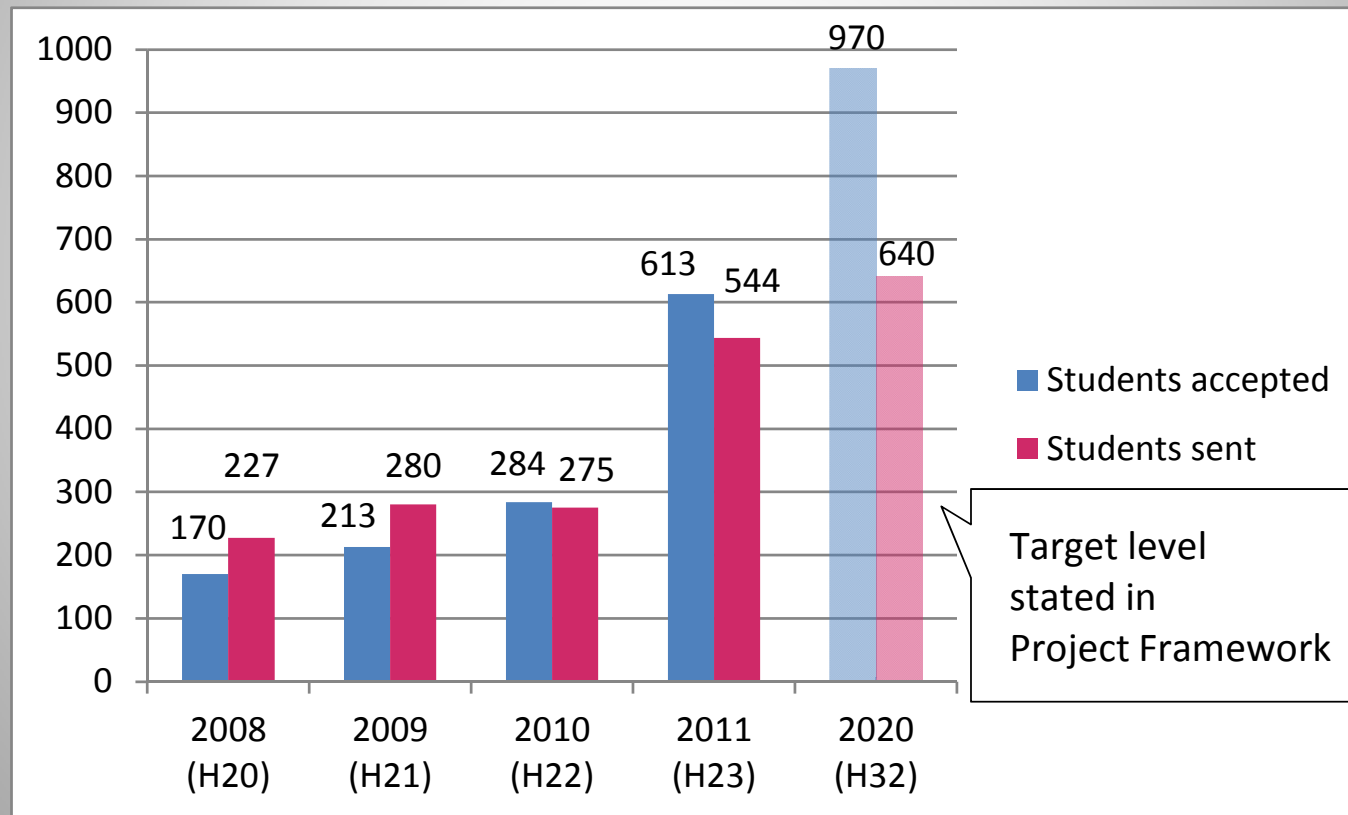
Foreign Faculty and Researchers



(As of the end of each academic year)

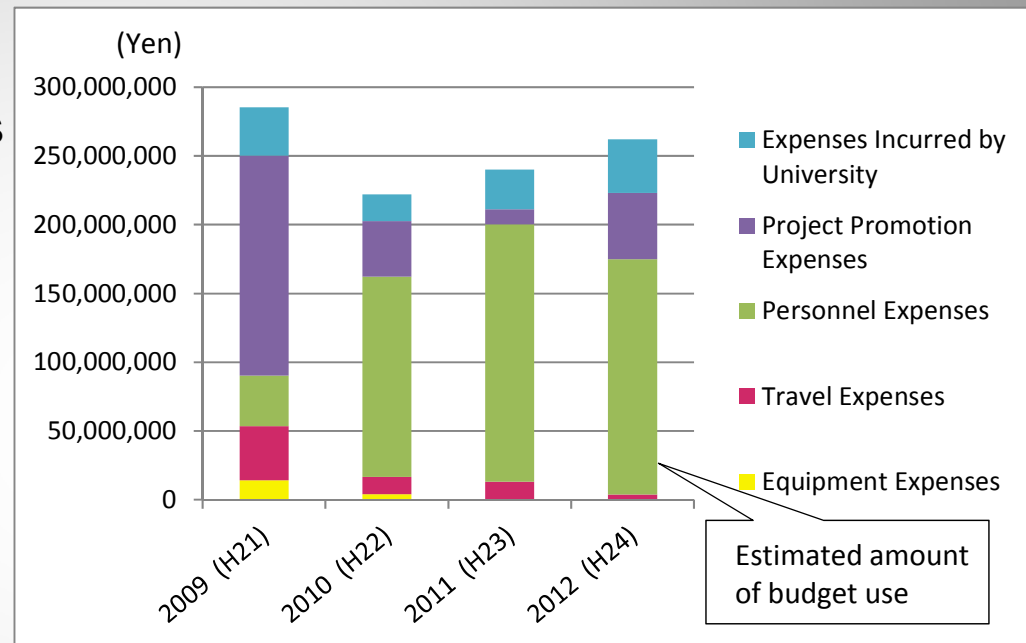

4. Use of Funding (Subsidies)

- ◆ Use of funding to date
 - PR and student recruitment activities in Japan and overseas
 - Basic preparation for project implementation
 - Hiring of faculty and staff
- ◆ Characterization of funding provided by Osaka University
 - Supplementary funds for project implementation



- ◆ Status of internal audit
 - Funds will be distributed after the screening and approval by the Planning Office Meeting and by the Planning Coordination Committee, based on budget request from each departments
 - Regular audits are carried out by the Audit Office of Osaka University (annually)

5. Future Issues and Prospects Following Project Completion

- ◆ Future issues and prospects
 - Continue to offer degree programs taught in English
 - Attract outstanding international students and offer them solid career support after graduation or course completion
 - G30 subjects will be made available within the university, and interaction between international students and Japanese students will be encouraged
 - Improve the English-speaking abilities of Japanese students, promoting their participation in overseas study programs
 - Further improve networks with other universities and encourage more in-depth communication between faculty and staff

- ◆ Prospects following project completion
 - Establish new programs for unsponsored international students and increase the percentage of international undergraduate students to 10%
 - Improve English-speaking abilities of Japanese students and promote their participation in overseas study programs
 - Continue to employ foreign faculty and researchers hired as part of the G30 Project
 - Obtain new external funding for implementing projects to promote internationalization
