
Increase in Exchange Students and Promoting the Globalization of Research








Increase in International Students

International Students by Nationality (2012) (as of May 1st)












Undergraduate Courses in English: The Institute for the Liberal Arts (ILA)






Nationality Diversification




Graduate Courses (Master's, Doctoral, Professional) in English

(as of October 1, 2012)










Decision-Making Process for Globalization Efforts and Management Policies



learning Japanese.


Halal food will be available at the university cafeteria by the end of this academic year. Also, the location for a prayer room has been secured.
