Slideshow with a projector (University style). We conducted a small experiment about eyewitness memory.

- Lecture summary (講義概要): Please summarize your lecture within 200-500 words.

The lecture was in four parts.

The first part was about <u>France</u> (my country of origin). First, what France is famous for, like cities, food, etc. Then, how is school in France: the different types of schools, depending of the age of children, and different periods of the year, with holidays, etc.

Second part was about <u>my motivations for becoming a scientist</u>, and the importance of science to help understanding the world and improving people's life. Then, I talked about the different dimensions that are studied at <u>psychology</u> university: functioning of brain, behavior, and society.

Third part was about <u>my own research in criminology with JSPS</u>. First, what are the false beliefs and pseudoscience about criminal psychology. Then, what is really studied in criminology (causes of criminal behavior, programms to prevent crimes, helping investigations). Then I explained the functionning of memory, and we conducted a small experiment of a few minutes to highlight that memory is not always good. Then I explained

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about the face stereotypes of criminality (for example, which face features are related to perceived criminality / innocence); and the impact that these stereotypes can have on the quality of investigation.

The last part was about the importance of learning english. First, as a scientist, for the purpose of reading and writing science litterature and sharing discoveries in international conferences. Secon, not only as a scientist, but also for everyday life: for example to travel or enjoy international arts and news. Then, I gave the student some tips to learn english – this was a request from Fukushima's high school professors.

After the lectures, students had time to prepare presentations and questions, and the it was Q&A and presentation time.

Today, I worked as an assistant during the lecture.

During Ms. Noc's presentation, I translated several English words, which might be difficult for students when Ms. Noc asked me to do so.

During group work, I helped students' deeper understanding by translating communication between Ms. Noc and students, as well as directly answering to their questions about the content.

Although I occasionally used Japanese to support students, most of the communication was conducted in English.
