



Data Catalog, cross-sectoral bulk search of data enabled in the humanities and social sciences

▶ What is Japan Data Catalog for the Humanities and Social Sciences (JDCat)?

JDCat compiles metadata (e.g., information on authors and time periods) provided by research institutes participating in this program. Through cross-sectoral data search, JDCat facilitates access to a wide variety of humanities and social sciences data held by these research institutes. An English version of the Catalog is provided for use by overseas researchers (some metadata are omitted).

Examples of system usage

- Data needed for your research can be retrieved via bulk search of multiple data archives.
- Citation/use of your research data is expanded when your metadata deposited in participating research institutes are listed in JDCat.
- The catalog can be used for education as it allows teachers and students to use the same data when, for example, teaching analytical methods.
